



Chagall, Montreal, and Quebec May 21-28, 2017

Join CMA Executive Director Nannette Maciejunes and Chief Curator David Stark on a Canadian adventure to Montreal and Quebec. The highlight of our trip will be the Montreal Museum of Fine Art's exhibition *Chagall: Colour and Music*. With 400 works of art, this large-scale multidisciplinary exhibition explores the importance of music for Marc Chagall. We'll spend four nights at the Place d'Armes Hotel in the old quarter—opposite the breathtaking Notre-Dame Basilica, and steps from the Old Port and its fabulous restaurants. Our group will enjoy a welcome dinner at the Auberge Saint-Gabriel, a restaurant with a contemporary flair in an historic setting. The next morning we will stroll through the narrow lanes and ancient squares of Montreal, home to one of the continent's greatest collections of 17th, 18th, and 19th century buildings. Whether you are looking for fashion, antiques, or art, you will find it in Montreal—and we have reserved a whole day for you to explore all that the city has to offer.

From Montreal we will take a train to Quebec, one of the loveliest cities in Canada, where we will spend three nights at the Auberge Saint-Antoine. While in Quebec, we will have lunch at the beautiful Montmorency Falls, a walking tours of old Quebec and the Citadelle, visit the National Museum of Fine Arts, and enjoy a farewell dinner at the Private Garrison Club.

The cost of the trip is \$3900 double occupancy excluding airfare; single supplement is \$1200. Space is limited. A deposit of \$2000 will reserve your place on the trip. Deposits are due no later than January 15 with final payment due on March 15. Checks should be made payable to Art Escapes. All deposits are refundable with a cancellation fee of \$975. After March 15, no refunds will be made unless Art Escapes cancels the trip. This trip entails a great deal of walking on uneven surfaces.
